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EDITHVALE BIRD HIDE UPDATE

The repair of the Birdhide has been a long process, lots of meetings and emails between the busy sub committee.... But there has been some positive progress.

Ages ago we met with Kingston's Building Surveyor, Heshan, who gave us lots of information and helpful suggestions. He seems sympathetic to our needs and aspirations – so we will be engaging him as our Building Surveyor. His job will be to assess our building permit application and either grant it or deny it, giving suggestions as to changes. He will also be responsible to make sure that the builder is doing what Structural Engineer specified in the permit application.

Next was finding a Structural Engineer to tell us what we can and can't do. That was easy as we had already spoken to Lowe Brothers Construction to see if they would either take on the repair as a Rotary Project (Brian Lowe is a member of our local Rotary club) or do the repairs as a paid job. It is beyond Rotary, so we are engaging Lowe Construction as our builder. They have their own Structural Engineer, whom we met this week at the Hide to see if the repairs were a viable option. Shane, the Structural Engineer agrees that the legs can be replaced.

The Shane will now prepare a list of what is needed, new metal feet for all the posts, the Builder will draw up the plans for the repair work and this will be submitted to Kingston Council for them to grant a building permit.

The plan is to pin the timbers about 40 cm from the ground, cut off the old legs, jack the hide up and add new feet that will raise the height of the hide so that taller people can stand up in the down stairs section. The new legs will be bolted on and obviously new material used to fill in the gap between the old timber poles and the ground.

Melbourne Water has allocated some funds to pay for the Structural Engineer, the Drafting of the plans and submission to Council. We will have to raise the funds to do the actual repairs and this could be around the \$50,000 mark.... So fingers crossed that all our ducks line up and we will be doing repairs in April 2015.

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FESWI'S DISTINGUISHED VISITORS

n Sunday 10th August, volunteers from FESWI recently hosted two distinguished visitors, Chris Mooney-Singh and David Morley at the Discovery Centre.

Chris, an Australian of Irish descent, adopted Sikhism in 1989 following early interest in meditation and a fascination with the Eastern arts. In his 30s he came in contact with Sikh philosophy conveyed through its poetry and classical music. Now after 23 years of living in India, Singapore and Malaysia, he is living back in Melbourne's bayside suburb, Bonbeach, while doing a post-doctoral fellowship in Creative Writing at Monash.

With Savinder Kaur, he is the co-founder of Poetry Slam in Singapore and Malaysia, an organisation that curates the National Singapore Poetry Slam, the Singapore National Youth Poetry Slam League and Playright Fest. He has also performed poetry regularly before mass audiences of all ages and conducting cross-genre writing and performance classes for thousands of students.

Seaford Working Bees: Rex is planting at Seaford on the western side of the Seaford site, near the Patterson River Secondary College. The group is planting understorey plants between trees that it planted some years ago. Unexpected help arrived in the form of a local family and a couple during the August working bee – thanks for that. If you would like to plant for the future, please ring Rex on 9766 6056.

Melbourne Water ESM Compliance Report: The ESM report has been received from the contracting company, with a good result, and minor modifications for Duck In. It is hoped that Melbourne Water will cover the fee required for this as part of the lease. The cost of this is \$1500 per annum. Recommendations include yellow lines for better sight inside the building, and repairing the concrete outside (a MW responsibility). The committee determined to continue to use the building for meetings and FESWI functions, and for the November Open Day.

AGL Electricity Account for Duck Inn: The last account for Duck In was a huge overcharge (\$1,644) when compared to normal bills, following the replacement of the old meter for a smart meter. This was referred to the ombudsman and the local member for Mordialloc, Lorraine Wreford, with a resolution following five weeks later.

Duck In Break-ins: one of the young men who were involved in the second break in at Duck In, has volunteered to do some clean-up work at Duck In which the committee may follow up depending on availability of a member to supervise.

CLC: Philippa attended the CLC meeting held on 18 June. The following highlights of the meeting were:- CCTV cameras are to be installed at the Discovery Centre, with views of the wetlands, and the film on-line so that it can be viewed on the website; there was a fox eradication program at Seaford in May; phragmites were slashed at Edithvale, (Seaford was too wet for this to be done); the Wetland Master Plan ends in 2016, there is to be further update planning and FESWI will be involved.

Grants: FESWI has received two grants from Kingston Council. \$837 for an Ipad; and \$1,000 for volunteer training and the Open Day in November. Thanks Kinston Council.

GREEN WEDGE TOUR

henever I head east from my place in Edithvale I'm most likely to be off to the restaurants of Springvale, looking for some retail therapy at my favorite factory outlets or else heading for the tollway or Princes Highway for a getaway.

All this time I've been largely unaware of what lies off my beaten track. That is where this tour took us, and what a revelation it was! The green open space with its diversity of thriving primary industry and its chain of parklands is extensive.

On 18 June, standing in as the FESWI representative on the Kingston Climate Change and Biodiversity

Reference Group, I joined a number of community representatives on an exploration of Kingston's Green Wedge. This includes all the land outside the Urban Growth Boundary in the City of Kingston. It extends from Karkarook Park in the north to Braeside Park in the south, and includes two small areas of land in Aspendale Gardens and Patterson Lakes.

Our tour took us past a

variety of markets gardens, an egg farm, go cart racetrack and the last remaining sand quarry. Phar Lap's former training track, at Braeside Park, was also a feature.

Beginning at Karkarook Park, we made several stops to enjoy the parklands now being developed from the old sand quarries once prevalent in this area but now designated for open space leisure pursuits including walking, cycling and horse riding. Here its former quarries are now recreational lakes, showing what can be done with the rest of the quarries, if and when the relevant State and local governments get on with the job. Further along we took a short walk down the Henry Street trail, a pleasant dirt track through trees. These are both part of the proposed Chain of Parks linked by a shared use pedes-

trian, cycle and possibly horse trail all the way to Braeside Park. This idea has been supported by successive local and state governments and the community, the 2002 development of Karkarook Park being an important catalyst project. (For more about the Chain of Parks, follow the link below)

While the Council is united in support of the Chain of Parks, they have taken two years to actually begin the process of rezoning the land north of Heatherton Road from Special Use Zone (extractive industry) to Green Wedge A Zone, which prohibits concrete crushers and other waste-processing activ-

ities. The quarries and landfills are all now within a few years of completion and the rezoning is needed to make sure the land remains available and is not appropriated for concrete crushers or other industrial uses.

I asked about wetlands: Council has plans for a new wetland development that will slow the flow of floodwaters and stop the flow of silt into Mordialloc Creek, but this will probably not affect the Edithvale Wet-

lands on the other side of the creek. As the Edithvale Wetlands have been surrounded by houses they are not in the Green Wedge, while Seaford Wetlands are in the Frankston part of the South East Green Wedge. Braeside Park also has some good wetlands and the Kingston Green Wedge Plan proposes a wetland on the Green Wedge triangle between Aspendale Gardens and Waterways, although this won't be possible if the Council's plan to rezone this land into 2000m2 house blocks goes ahead. Some councillors would like to keep one of the Delta quarries as a flood retention basin and bird habitat.

We were taken to the Deals Road Reserve where there is a go-kart track, motor bike and pistol clubs in among the last of the landfills. In their favour, Continued on Page 5

these facilities are well away from residential areas and are not causing any nuisance to anyone.

It was sad, as the Chair of the Climate Change and Biodiversity Reference Group, Cr Rosemary West noted, that the flourishing market gardens and at least one of the golf courses we drove past are under threat from a Kingston Council resolutions to rezone the Green Wedge south of Heatherton Road for residential development or to Rural Living Zone with a minimum lot size of 2000m2. This would allow the Green Wedge to be subdivided into low density house lots. The Friends of Braeside Park say they were not consulted regarding Council's resolution to have land on the boundary rezoned for housing development.

Cr West said councillors have been advised that the Planning Minister, Matthew Guy, is currently unlikely to approve such applications. Hence, she said, the five councillors who want such development have resolved to undertake further strategic studies to try to improve their chances. This should delay any formal request to the Minister until after the November State Election, which leaves the genuine market gardeners in limbo, while the speculators in this and other Green Wedges may have their hopes raised for windfall gains.
