No such luck again that day however I am told that Melbourne Water Staff were lucky enough to catch a sight of the bittern the following Sunday 17 May 2015.



The sighting was passed onto Birdlife Australia, and to the Bitterns in Rice Project, which sent the following response back – "Edithvale is a place we suspect some bitterns from the NSW Riverina might use during winter (because there seems to be an influx then), so who knows, maybe your bird is a bird from the rice crops. Thanks for taking the time to report your sighting. "

BITTERNS IN RICE PROJECT

ince 2012, the project has been uncovering the well-guarded secrets of Australia's Bunyip Bird – the globally endangered Australasian Bittern – and raising awareness of its plight. We now know there is a breeding population that descends on the rice crops of the NSW Riverina each year, and in most years it numbers between 500 and 1000. This is remarkable, as there are only 1500-4000 individuals remaining in the world; Australia, New Zealand and New Caledonia.

Our vision is to see bitterns and other significant wildlife prosper alongside rice-growing in the Riverina. We want to demonstrate that food production and wildlife conservation can work

together, building on the existing habitat values of rice crops. As global demand for food continues to grow, the need to better incorporate biodiversity into agriculture also grows. Dedicated conservation areas, such as fenced-off wetlands or national parks, are central yet inadequate in conserving biodiversity.

Crucially, we have the support of hundreds of rice farmers, many of whom feel the habitat values of rice-growing have been overlooked and are delighted to be able to produce a high quality food, supporting threatened species at the same time.

TAKE A WALK ON THE WILD SIDE

If you live near a wetland (and even if you don't) get yourself out for a walk around one this winter. If you go when the air is still, the sky pale blue, and the sun is westering – you're in a magical place.

You can see the angled sun highlighting the plumy tops of the phragmite and the river reds with golden light. The eye gets the long view, as from distinct from the short view it generally gets in our cluttered urban environment, and you can see the suggestion of a mist forming in the distance, and above, the soaring and circling of the Swamp Harrier. The warm, pearly luminescence of the western skies starkly contrasts with the cold and steely light of an occasional intrusive street lamp.

The air is still and crisp. You can hear small birds settling into their roosts for the night with sleepy talk (except, of course, the black bird, which scolds

until the sun sets) and the Common Froglets calling from the reed beds.

On the calm wetland waters, reflecting a myriad of colours from the sky and surroundings, a small fleet of swans may sail by.



I used to run around the wetlands until the old knees sent up such a stream of complaint and invective to GHQ that I had to stop. Now I find it is more rewarding to walk - more time to imbibe and appreciate the ambience. **Try it.** Number 136
